



- "We need to hide it," said Holly.
- "It's too big!" said Sid.


 Kick sat on a branch to think.
- "I have it," she said. "Sid, go and tell the man that a giant lives nearby. The giant will be very angry when he sees all his trees chopped down."




- "Tell him it's not smart to make the giant angry," said Holly. "The giant eats little men like him for lunch."

- "No, silly," said Kick, "I made it up. Hurry now, Sid! Holly and I will get to work."








- "You are strong and brave," said Sid.

 - "No one has feet that big," The man chuckled. "I'm going home now, but I will be back to chop down that tree."




- At noon, the squirrels saw the woodcutter. Kick and Holly hid while Sid ran down the path to meet him.

"I think so," said Sid. "Most days, his steps sound like thunder. Today he has taken off his boots to sneak up on you. He has lost a sock, as you can see."






When the woodcutter saw the sock, he gasped and turned pale with fear. Then he ran home.
